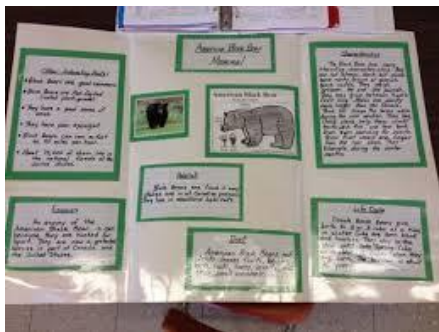
Mini Project - (22nd - 26th) Design your animal

ORANGUTAN

Orangutans are the only member of the great ape family that can be found exclusively in Asia. They are native to Malaysia and Indonesia. In the wild they can only be found in the rainforests on the islands of Borneo and Sumatra.

With arms reaching 7 feet (2 meters) from fingertip to fingertip, orangutans are aptly suited for a life in the trees of Southeast Asia.

How long are the orangutans arms compared to you?

There are only two species of Orangutan and both of these are endangered: the Bornean Orangutan (*Pongo pygmaeus*) and the critically endangered Sumatran Orangutan (*Pongo abelii*).

About 97% of an Orangutan's genetic makeup is the same as a human's. Orangutans are so dependent upon trees, they are particularly susceptible to logging. Unfortunately, deforestation and other human activities, such as hunting, have placed the Orangutan in danger of extinction.

A female Orangutan has a baby on average only once every 8 years, after it is born the baby will stay with its mother for eleven to twelve years; male Orangutans become fully mature at about fifteen years of age.

GIRAFFES

A newborn giraffe is about 1.8m tall. Within a few hours of birth the calf can run around.

Giraffes eat only green leaves.

Fully grown male giraffes are 5-6 m and weigh more than 1000kg. Males are usually taller and have thicker necks than females.

A giraffe has only two gaits: walking and galloping; it can reach a sprint of up to 60km/h.

They can live up to 25 years in the wild.

The giraffe's tongue is about 50 cm long. It is purplish-black in color, perhaps to protect against sunburn. And is useful to scratch and clean the animal's coat.

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
